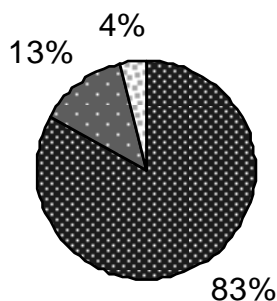

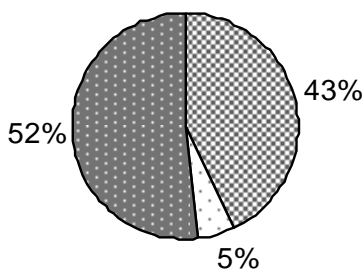
Parish's FINANCIAL HEALTH

INCOME Fiscal Year 2009–2010



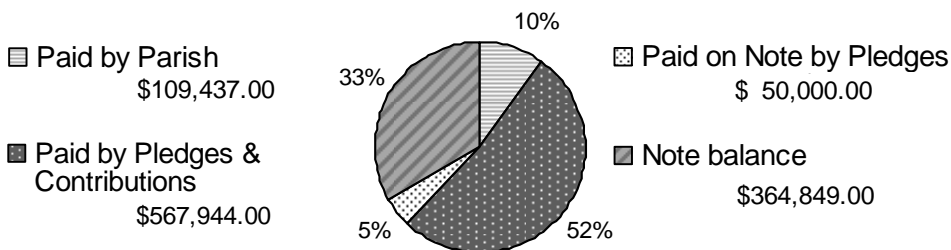

Confirmation In order for our children to continue on their spiritual journey and be confirmed in their faith, the young people need to prepare for the sacrament.

We have a one year preparation program which is open to high school students who are actively practicing their faith by attending Sunday Mass and receiving the Eucharist, and going to the sacrament of Reconciliation on a regular basis. They must either have been attending Catholic school or had a least one year of catechesis in a parish religious education program during the year immediately prior to entering this program. If they are unable to meet this requirement, they will be placed in the Pre-confirmation program, also for one year to prepare students (8th and above) for entering the Confirmation program.—*Patt Hughes*

Evangelization Go make disciples! This is a powerful command from our Lord Jesus Christ, when he sent his disciples to proclaim the Gospel to all the world. What a send off, however he is telling us the same thing. Each one of us is a disciple.

Let's ASK!

Why do we have to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation?

Since the Eucharistic species (consecrated host and consecrated wine) are truly the body and blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, it is easy to see why this is called the “source and summit of Christian Life.” (*Lumen Gentium p. 11*) This is Jesus. Receiving the Eucharist worthily is the closest we can come to our Savior. We need to be careful, however, not to reduce the Eucharist to just what we physically receive. The entire sacrifice of the Mass is all part of the Eucharist. We gather together as a praying community to give praise to our Lord with our hearts and voices. We also give thanks to the Lord for the blessings that God gives us, especially the gift of suffering and dying for us. We also pray for our personal needs, the needs of our community and all humanity.

We Catholics are a believing and praying community. We are part of the body of Christ. When we gather together in this highest form of prayer we acknowledge this to ourselves and the whole world. This is necessary to the health of our faith and for our salvation. The Church, in her role as guide of the people, has made it a requirement, under pain of mortal sin, except for serious reason, to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.
